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KEY STORY

SPDC still afraid of "The Lady"

On 25 May, the SPDC extended the detention of pro-democracy leader Daw Aung San Suu Kyi for another year. Eager to put an end to the unprecedented outpouring of domestic and international appeals for her release, the junta issued the extension order two days before her detention was set to expire.¹

Obviously more afraid of Daw Aung San Suu Kyi's popularity than international opinion, the regime ignored all calls for the release of the Nobel Peace Prize laureate:

- **6 May:** Malaysian FM Syed Hamid Albar urged the SPDC to release Daw Aung San Suu Kyi. “Our position has not changed. They [SPDC] should not continue with her detention,” he said.²
- **10 May:** 14 United Nations human rights experts joined together to call on the SPDC to free Daw Aung San Suu Kyi. “As of one of the world's most acclaimed human rights defenders, the Nobel Peace Prize laureate is a major political and spiritual leader of Myanmar,” the experts said in a joint statement.³
- **14 May:** 59 former heads of state and government from Asia, Europe, the Americas, and Africa jointly called on the SPDC to immediately release Daw Aung San Suu Kyi.⁴
- **14 May:** The ASEAN Inter-Parliamentary Myanmar Caucus (AIPMC) reiterated calls for the immediate release of Burma's democracy icon.⁵
- **14 May:** The National League for Democracy (NLD) called on the SPDC to immediately release its leader Daw Aung San Suu Kyi.⁶ The call was reiterated on 18 and 27 May.⁷
- **22 May:** ASEAN nations appealed to the SPDC not to renew Daw Aung San Suu Kyi's detention. “It's a consensus that we want to see her early release,” Philippine Foreign Undersecretary Erlinda Basilio said.⁸
- **24 May:** The European Union called on the SPDC to release Daw Aung San Suu Kyi.⁹
- **26 May:** UN Sec-Gen Ban Ki-moon repeated his call for the release of Daw Aung San Suu Kyi after the SPDC extended her detention.¹⁰

Campaigns and activities

Defying threats, attacks, and arrests, pro-democracy activists carried out various campaigns and initiatives in support of Daw Aung San Suu Kyi throughout May:

- **1 May:** NLD launched a month-long prayer campaign calling for the release of Daw Aung San Suu Kyi. The campaign called on activists to pray for the release of the pro-democracy leader at pagodas around the country.¹¹
- **20 May:** Members of the 88 Generation Students group concluded their “White Sunday” campaign by visiting Daw Aung San Suu Kyi's cousin, sister, and brother in Rangoon to express solidarity ahead of the review of the Nobel Peace Prize laureate's detention term.¹²
- **21 May:** NLD youth members launched a t-shirt campaign in support of Daw Aung San Suu Kyi. The groups distributed t-shirts bearing her image and the slogan “Free Aung San Suu Kyi”.¹³
- **27 May:** About 500 pro-democracy activists gathered at the NLD headquarters in Rangoon to mark the election the party won in 1990. NLD members were joined by former student activists and several foreign diplomats. About 50 plain-clothed police were stationed outside the NLD

headquarters, many taking photographs and videos of the activists.¹⁴ The NLD reiterated in a statement its call on the regime for tripartite dialogue. The 88 Generation Students group also issued a statement calling for a political solution to achieve national reconciliation.¹⁵

Harassment and arrests

During the month of May, the regime's crackdown against NLD members and other political activists intensified. At least 60 activists were detained for peacefully expressing their support to Daw Aung San Suu Kyi.

- **15 May:** Plain-clothed SPDC special branch police officers and members of the junta-backed Union Solidarity and Development Association (USDA) arrested and took into custody 31 activists, including human rights defender Su Su Nway. The activists were on their way to pray for the release of Daw Aung San Suu Kyi from two different locations in Rangoon.¹⁶
- **16 May:** USDA members arrested 15 activists, including NLD youth members, as they left a pagoda in Rangoon after praying for the release of Daw Aung San Suu Kyi. They were released later the same day.¹⁷ SPDC authorities arrested 62-year-old NLD member Daw Tin Tin Maw in front of Rangoon's City Hall after she staged a protest calling for the release of Daw Aung San Suu Kyi.¹⁸
- **19 May:** Three activists were arrested as they headed to a temple in central Rangoon to pray for the release Daw Aung San Suu Kyi.¹⁹
- **20 May:** About 100 activists headed to a pagoda in Rangoon to pray for the release of Daw Aung San Suu Kyi and her supporters were reportedly prevented from entering the pagoda and had to pray outside. The activists were then trailed and photographed by plain-clothed police.²⁰
- **21 May:** SPDC authorities arrested two NLD members in Rangoon. A woman was taken into custody as she led a prayer vigil for Daw Aung San Suu Kyi, and a man was arrested at a different location in the city.²¹
- **24 May:** SPDC authorities in Myitkyina, Kachin State, arrested former political prisoner U Htun Lwin for staging a protest calling for the release of Daw Aung San Suu Kyi.²²
- **25 May:** SPDC authorities arrested six NLD members after they went to pagodas in Rangoon to pray for the release of Daw Aung San Suu Kyi.²³ A large group of people from the USDA and the paramilitary group, Phythu Swan Arr Shin, assaulted 30 NLD members praying for the release of Daw Aung San Suu Kyi at Kyaukhtutgyi pagoda in Rangoon. Lae Lae Win Swe, Secretary of Tarmwe USDA, reportedly led the group of assailants.²⁴

- **27 May:** SPDC authorities arrested eight activists, including NLD elected MP U Bala. They were all released the following day.²⁵ Junta-backed thugs prevented about 300 supporters of Daw Aung San Suu Kyi from marching to Rangoon's Shwedagon pagoda to hold a prayer vigil for the detained pro-democracy leader.²⁶
- **29 May:** SPDC authorities arrested activist Ko Tun Tun for attending a prayer meeting at Rangoon's Shwedagon pagoda.²⁷

INSIDE BURMA

Soe Win's *adieu*

While no official retirement has been announced, it is apparent that the SPDC's current premier, Gen Soe Win, will not return to active duty. He is currently in Singapore where he is reportedly being treated for leukemia. On 18 May, the state-run newspaper New Light of Myanmar referred to Lt-Gen Thein Sein, the SPDC Secretary-1, as "acting Prime Minister" of the SPDC.²⁸

NGO closures

In yet another attempt to cripple independent civil society groups and replace them with junta-backed organizations, on 16 May the SPDC outlawed 24 independent organizations, including the Free Funeral Service Society and the Guru Nanak Hospital and threatened them with legal action.²⁹ The Ministry of Home Affairs informed the groups that they would not be issued new registration licenses. In the space created by the outlawing of these organizations, the USDA has reportedly begun providing free funeral services.³⁰ There have also been reports of the USDA opening free clinics in townships of Rangoon Division and coercing local doctors to donate their services. Businesses and patients have also been asked to make donations.³¹

Karen offensive continues

During May, the regime's military offensive in Karen State continued unabated, with the SPDC Army amassing new troops on the frontline.³² Military forces continue to indiscriminately target civilians. The attacks are sustained with the use of forced labor and extortion from villagers.³³

- **Early May:** SPDC Army troops burned five villages that were home to more than 540 internally displaced Karen civilians in an area controlled by the Karen National Union (KNU)'s 3rd brigade. SPDC Army troops reportedly also burned villages in an area located on the northern edge of Papun District, Karen State, resulting in 4,200 villagers from 28 villages fleeing their homes.³⁴

- **12 May:** SPDC Army troops from LIB 542 and 544 attacked the Ber Ka Lay Ko village, located in northern Toungoo District, Northwestern Karen State. During the attack soldiers raped and murdered a local woman.³⁵
- **15 May:** SPDC Army soldiers from LIB 542 shot and killed villagers Saw Hsar Mee, 55, Saw Kwa Kwa, 20, and Saw Mu Der, 36.³⁶

17 May: SPDC Army troops killed Naw Bu Ru, a 27 year-old villager from Papun District.³⁷

SPDC Army attacks KNU, aborts talks with SSA-S

- On 22 May, joint forces from the SPDC Army and the Democratic Karen Buddhist Army renewed attacks on Karen National Union (KNU) forces in Kawkayeik, Karen State.³⁸ KNU reported killing seven opposition forces and wounding seven others.³⁹
- Ceasefire talks scheduled for 23 May between SPDC Army and Shan State Army – South officials collapsed when the SPDC delegation failed to appear at the designated meeting site.⁴⁰

Polio outbreak

Despite a SPDC declaration that Burma has been free of polio since 2000, a recent outbreak of the disease that infected at least seven children was reported in Maungdaw Township in May. The outbreak resulted in a rapid international response, which further illustrates the regime's inability to respond to serious health crises.⁴¹ UNICEF announced that it will conduct cross-border immunization campaigns, the first to be launched in early June and the second campaign in July. Altogether, the campaigns are expected to immunize 2 million children under age 5 in Burma and Bangladesh.⁴²

HUMAN RIGHTS

New wave of arrests

- **1 May:** SPDC authorities took into custody about 30 people attending public lectures on workers' issues held at the American Center in Rangoon. Twenty-seven were released after several hours of interrogation.⁴³ SPDC authorities also detained three members of the rights group Human Rights Defenders and Promoters (HRDP) in Latha Township, Rangoon Division, and sentenced them to seven days in Insein Prison.⁴⁴
- **2 May:** SPDC authorities in Rangoon arrested human rights activists Ko Aung Kyaw Soe, Ko Aye Lwin, and Ko Yin Kyi on charges of violating guest registration laws.⁴⁵
- **21 May:** SPDC authorities arrested NLD youth member Khin Htun after he visited Su Su Nway at the Muslim Free Hospital in Rangoon.⁴⁶

Detention conditions

The month of May provided more evidence of the regime's failure to comply with minimum standards for treatment of prisoners in Burma.

- On 18 May, U Maung Thein Aung, a 28-year-old villager from Akyab Township, Arakan State, died in the Kauk Kouk labor camp, in Mrauk U Township. He had been sentenced to three years in jail on 5 May for burglary.⁴⁷
- Detained rights activist Su Su Nway was hospitalized at the Muslim Free Hospital in Rangoon, days after she was taken into custody following a peaceful prayer campaign for the release of Daw Aung San Suu Kyi on 15 May.⁴⁸
- The health of U Aye Kyaw, a 74-year-old former political leader who is detained in Pauktaw police detention center, is reportedly deteriorating since his arrest at the end of April.⁴⁹
- Rights activist Ko Myint Naing was reportedly denied medical treatment and meetings with his family members. Ko Myint Naing, is being detained in Hintada Jail.⁵⁰

Freedom of information

On the occasion of World Press Freedom Day, several independent organizations released studies that document the oppressive media environment created by Burma's military regime:

- **1 May:** Rights watchdog Freedom House released its "Freedom of the Press 2007" annual survey. Burma ranks as one of the worst places in the world for press freedom, beaten only by North Korea.⁵¹
- **2 May:** The Committee to Protect Journalists (CPJ) stated that Burma is among the worst-rated countries for press freedom.⁵²
- **3 May:** Reporters Sans Frontières (RSF) included the SPDC leader Sr-Gen Than Shwe on a list of 34 world leaders and organizations that stand as direct threats to the freedom of the press.⁵³

Evidence of the regime's iron grip on media and writers surfaced again in the month of May:

- On 21 May, SPDC authorities took into custody Aung Shwe Oo and Sint Sint Aung, two journalists on assignment for the Japanese television news agency Nippon News Network (NNN) in Rangoon. The reporters were believed to have been detained for covering the arrival of a North Korean ship supposedly carrying armaments to Burma. [See *International Relations* below] They were both released on 23 May.⁵⁴
- The SPDC's Press Scrutiny Board banned the publication of a biography of Burma's late Prime Minister U Nu, which was to be released on 25 May. The censorship board denied permission saying that it was not the right time for a book on U Nu.⁵⁵

DISPLACEMENT

Migrant workers arrivals and arrests Thailand

An increased number of migrant workers from Burma entered Thailand in May despite heavy rains, and tighter controls. More than 2,000 arrived at the Chong Zon check point, Three Pagoda's Pass between

18 April and 6 May.⁵⁶ Meanwhile the Thai army, police, and immigration officers continue to arrest migrant workers and their families, including children.

- **8-9 May:** Thai army, police, and immigration officers arrested about 800 migrant workers from Burmain Mae Sot.⁵⁷
- **24 May:** Thai border police arrested over 160 Burma nationals in Sangkhlaburi, Kanchanburi Province.⁵⁸

Migrant workers protest new law

Reports that restrictions on migrant workers put in place in Phuket, Ranong and Suratthani, Southern Thailand, will now also be implemented in Chiang Mai angered migrant groups. On 1 May, 50 migrant workers from Burma along with thousands of others from the Workers' Union of Thailand demonstrated in front of the Thai parliament hall in Bangkok, demanding removal of the stricter laws.⁵⁹ On 11 May, migrant workers and labor activists in Chiang Mai submitted a letter to the province's governor protesting the restrictions, which include a banning of cell phone and motorcycle use, and a night time curfew.⁶⁰ [See *April 2007 Burma Bulletin*]

INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS

Russia: SPDC gets nuclear energy, gives oil

In a move that will finally fulfill the SPDC's desire for nuclear energy, on 15 May the Russian atomic energy agency, Rosatom, announced that Russian and the SPDC officials signed an agreement to build a nuclear reactor in Burma.⁶¹ Rosatom indicated that the agreement covers the design and construction of a nuclear research center that will contain a 10 megawatt light-water reactor and facilities for processing and storing nuclear waste. Russia will also train 300-350 specialists for the center.⁶² Rosatom said the site will be monitored by the UN nuclear watchdog, the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA). However, on 17 May the IAEA said that Burma's military regime had not reported plans to build a nuclear reactor to the group.⁶³

On 16 May, the US State Department expressed its opposition to the Russian plan to build the nuclear research center in Burma. A State Department spokesman said Burma has no standards for safe handling of nuclear materials and that the US has serious concerns about nuclear fuel being diverted for use in a weapons program.⁶⁴

On 12 May, a joint oil exploration venture between SPDC owned Myanmar Oil and Gas Enterprise (MOGE) and two Russian companies, Silver Wave Sputnik Petroleum and Silver Wave Energy, held a ceremony in Pinlebu, Sagaing Division, to launch the drilling of their first test well.⁶⁵

India: energy and arms top agenda with SPDC

On 12 May, Jane's Defense Weekly confirmed that the Indian Navy is in the process of transferring two BN-2 'Defender' Islander maritime surveillance aircraft to the SPDC.⁶⁶ Indian Navy Chief, Admiral Sureesh Mehta, was expected to finalize details of aircraft transfer during his four-day visit to Burma that ended on 13 May.⁶⁷

Indian petroleum companies, GAIL and ONGC Videsh are reassessing their involvement in their Burma operations following a reported SPDC decision to sell gas to China. The SPDC decision to sell the gas to China was made despite the fact that China was not the high bidder for the gas. GAIL is now questioning its future investments in Burma, as well as its participation in the pipeline from A-1 and A-3 blocks.⁶⁸ GAIL's concerns follow an ONGC decision earlier this month to withdraw from the Burma-India pipeline project due to China's influence on the SPDC.⁶⁹

South Korea: SPDC decision to give gas to China irks Daewoo, too

Following the announcement to sell gas to China, Daewoo Corporation, the largest stakeholder in the A-1 and A-3 blocks, sent a team of legal experts and senior company executives to explain to the SPDC the legal consequences of their decision. However, the SPDC is unlikely to reverse its decision which is viewed as an expression of gratitude for "Beijing's support to Myanmar in the UN".⁷⁰

North Korea: second mystery ship from docks in Burma

On 20 May, a North Korean cargo ship, The Kang Nam I, docked at Thilawa port, 30 kilometers south of Rangoon.⁷¹ This was the second North Korean vessel to dock in Burma in the last seven months and the first to arrive since the SPDC restored diplomatic ties with Pyongyang at the end of April.⁷² [See *April 2007 Burma Bulletin*] In a statement that strained credibility, on 23 May the SPDC Foreign Ministry said that the ship was allowed to dock because it was in distress and taking shelter from a storm – the same reason given for the ship that docked in November.⁷³

US extends sanctions on Burma

On 17 May, US President George W. Bush informed the US Congress that he would renew sanctions against Burma because of concerns over the deepening deterioration of freedom in the military-ruled country.⁷⁴

UN: Gambari returns

On 22 May, UN Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon, appointed Ibrahim Gambari as his special adviser to Burma. In this capacity, Gambari will lead UN efforts to pursue the release of all political prisoners and promote democratic reforms in Burma.⁷⁵

ECONOMY

Trade figures at a record high

According to the SPDC's latest trade figures, Burma's foreign trade hit a new record high US\$8 billion in 2006-07, exceeding the original target of US\$7 billion. Burma's exports accounted for US\$5 billion, while the imports took US\$3 billion.⁷⁶

Burma traded most with Asian countries and regions in the fiscal year 2006-07, which ended in March.⁷⁷ [See Table]
